FIRE AND LIFE SAFETY INSPECTIONS OF PLACES OF PUBLIC ASSEMBLY

REASON FOR THE INVESTIGATION

The Nevada County Civil Grand Jury has the authority to initiate an investigation. The safety of a place of public assembly was questioned, and an investigation was initiated. Subsequently the safety of other public buildings came into question.

PROCEDURE FOLLOWED

Letters were written to 10 Fire Departments within Nevada County requesting certain information concerning their inspection programs for "Places of Public Assembly", as defined in the California Fire Code (formerly The Uniform Fire Code). The information requested included the location of all places of public assembly, the date of the last inspection, and any violations noted during the last inspection.

FINDINGS

- 1. There is a lack of continuity in the frequency of inspections among those Departments surveyed. Many Departments have an annual inspection program. Other Departments only inspect as a result of a complaint or a building permit check. Some Departments have little or no program at all.
- 2. The Grand Jury learned of plans to pool the resources of their inspection programs between some Departments. The goal of this move is to improve the frequency and professional quality of the inspections within these districts.
- 3. For simplicity, each Department contacted has been given a letter grade by the Grand Jury.
 - A- All places of public assembly inspected within the last year.
 - B- Most places of public assembly inspected within the last year.
 - C- Some places of public assembly inspected within the last year.
 - D- Few or no places of public assembly inspected within the last year.
 - F- Failed to respond to the Grand Jury questionnaire.
 - A- Ophir Hill Fire Department
 - A- Grass Valley Fire Department
 - A- Higgins Fire Department
 - A- Nevada County Consolidated Fire Department
 - A- Rough and Ready Fire Department
 - A- 49er Fire Department
 - B- No Department met this criteria

- C- Nevada City Fire Department
- D- Donner Summit Fire Department
- D- Penn Valley Fire Department
- D- Truckee Fire Department
- F- Peardale-Chicago Park Fire Department
- 4. Some of the violations noted by the various Fire Departments were: blocked exits, lack of required exits, lack of emergency lighting, burned out light bulbs in emergency lighting, improper storage of flammable materials, lack of "panic hardware", and locked doors on emergency exits.
- 5. These violations and lack of documented follow up inspections clearing such violations places the physical well being of visitors to places of public assembly in serious risk.

CONCLUSIONS

- 1. The citizens of Nevada County are entitled to a reasonable degree of safety when attending an event in a place of public assembly. Lack of annual fire and safety inspections may deprive the public of this important entitlement.
- 2. Some of the Fire Departments have not conducted annual fire and safety inspections in places of public assembly.
- 3. A single fire in a place of public assembly could adversely affect tourism within Nevada County for years to come. Annual inspections and documented follow-up inspections may reduce this risk.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. The Grand Jury encourages those Departments not currently conducting annual inspections of the places of public assembly within their districts to begin such a program.
- 2. Everyone in authority within a Fire Department in Nevada County should reference the National Fire Protection Handbook as published by the National Fire Protection Association. (Section 10-C) "Places of public assembly have long been recognized as a special concern for the fire department because of the life hazard involved."

Re: City of Nevada City's Response to the Nevada County Grand Jury Report

The City of Nevada City has recently taken several steps to improve fire service to the public. First of all, the City has hired the Fire Marshall for the 49'er Fire District to act as the City's Fire Marshall to replace Terry McMahan who acted as the City's Fire Marshall for many years and who went to work for the Consolidated Fire Department. It took a number of months to replace him, while the City explored whether it was appropriate to hire another Fire Marshall as an employee or simply contract with another agency. Secondly, the City has recently hired two additional fire department employees. In determining how many new employees to hire, the City awaited to see the results of the tax measure.

The Council strongly believes that with the hiring of David Ray, of the 49'er Fire District and the hiring of two additional fire department employees, that the City will be able to provide much better service to the public. One of the primary job of David Ray will be to make annual inspections of all places of public assembly and follow-up those inspections to make sure that all needed changes are made.

The following is the response of the Peardale-Chicago Park Fire Protection District to the 1999-2000 Civil Grand Jury Report as concerns Fire and Life Safety Inspections of Places of Public Assembly.

Findings:

1. There is lack of continuity in the frequency of inspections among those departments surveyed. Many departments have an annual inspection program. Other departments only inspect as a result of a complaint or a building permit check. Some departments have little or no program at all.

Response:

We agree with the finding that we have no inspection program for places of public assembly for the reason that we have no places of public assembly in our Fire District.

2. The Grand Jury learned of plans to pool the resources of their inspection programs between some departments. The goal of this move is to improve the frequency and professional quality of the inspections within these districts.

Response:

We agree with the finding. Any effort to improve the quality and frequency of inspections would receive our full support.

3. For simplicity each department contacted has been given a letter grade by the Grand Jury. F- Failed to respond to the Grand Jury questionnaire.

Response:

We agree with the finding. The failure to respond to the initial questionnaire was an oversight on our part owing to the fact that we have no places of public assembly in our Fire District.

4. Some of the violations noted by the various Fire Departments were: blocked exits, lack of required exits, lack of emergency lighting, burned out light bulbs in emergency lighting, improper storage of flammable materials, lack of "panic hardware", and locked doors on emergency exits.

Response:

We agree with the finding but have no first hand knowledge.

5. These violations and lack of documented follow up inspections clearing such violations places the physical well being of visitors to places of public assembly in serious risk.

Response:

We agree. Violations should be followed up to ensure compliance.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

1. The Grand Jury encourages those departments not currently conducting annual inspections of the places of public assembly within their fire districts to begin such a program.

Response:

We will not implement the recommendation because we have no places of Public assembly in our Fire District.

2. Everyone in authority within the Fire Department in Nevada County should reference the National Fire Protection handbook as published by the National Fire Protection Association (Section 10-C)"Places of public assembly have long been recognized as a special concern for the fire department because of the life hazard involved.



Dear Judge Bryan,

The Penn Valley Fire Protection District has recently completed inspecting all of its "Areas of Public Occupancy", as defined by the Uniform Fire Code (Exhibit A). In order that you may better understand our Occupancy Inspection Program and the corrective actions we have taken to ensure program accountability, our response is broken down into three areas; Occupancy Inspection Program, Program Deficiency, and Corrective Action.

Occupancy Inspection Program

The Penn Valley Fire Protection District utilizes its career fire staff at the Lake Wildwood Fire Station to conduct occupancy/business inspections. The knowledge gained through the inspection process is then applied in developing "Pre-Plans" on the various occupancies throughout the District. These "Pre-Plans are then carried on every engine throughout the District, and provide information on the occupancy in the event of an emergency.

When an inspection is performed a Fire Safety Inspection Form (Exhibit B) is generated as a record of the visit. If violations are observed a corrective period of 30 days is allowed, and a re-inspection is scheduled. Potentially life-threatening violations are corrected immediately. A list of occupancies is maintained at the Lake Wildwood Fire Station. The list is updated through several means. The most common of which is the "Pre-Plan" process, Tenant Improvement applications submitted to the District office, and visual observation of a business change or addition.

The inspection program is scheduled to occur annually. The exception to this is observed violations by staff in their daily interactions within the community, or by a complaint. In either event an inspection is conducted and a form generated documenting the visit.

Program Deficiency

It was due to your inquiry that we discovered a breakdown in our inspection program. Although direction had been given to conduct these inspections by District Administration and individuals assigned the responsibility of the program, the District Administration lacked knowledge that inspections were not being completed. The major failing of the program was a lack of positive verification that inspections were occurring.

Corrective Action

A "positive" verification system has been initiated to ensure that all occupancy inspections are being done. In essence all occupancies – areas of assembly, businesses, day care centers, and residential home care are to be inspected annually with a completion date of all occupancies of 60 days. A Fire Safety Inspection Form is to be generated on all inspections and a copy forwarded to the Battalion Chief, then to the Unit Chief for compliance with this policy. A master list of all occupancies within the District is maintained by the Battalion Chief to ensure all occupancies are inspected annually. A report will be generated to the District Board of Directors quarterly.

In closing I wish to thank the Grand Jury for bringing this matter to our attention. I can assure you that the staff of the Penn Valley Fire District, the Board of Directors, and I are very concerned about public safety. We welcome any future inquiries you may have about our District operations.



The Penn Valley Fire Protection District has recently completed inspecting all of its "Areas of Public Occupancy", as defined by the Uniform Fire Code (Exhibit A). A list of occupancies is maintained at the Lake Wildwood Fire Station. The list is updated through several means. The most common of which is the "Pre-Plan" process, Tenant Improvement applications submitted to the District office, and visual observation of a business change or addition.

The inspection program is scheduled to occur annually. The exception to this is observed violations by staff in their daily interactions within the community, or by a complaint. In either event an inspection is conducted and a form generated documenting the visit.

Program Deficiency

It was due to your inquiry that we discovered a breakdown in our inspection program. Although direction had been given to conduct these inspections by District Administration and individuals assigned the responsibility of the program, the District Administration lacked knowledge that inspections were not being completed. The major failing of the program was a lack of positive verification that inspections were occurring.

Corrective Action

A "positive" verification system has been initiated to ensure that all occupancy inspections are being done. In essence all occupancies – areas of assembly, businesses, day care centers, and residential home care are to be inspected annually with a completion date of all occupancies of 60 days. A Fire Safety Inspection Form is to be generated on all inspections and a copy forwarded to the Battalion Chief, then to the Unit Chief for compliance with this policy. A master list of all occupancies within the District is maintained by the Battalion Chief to ensure all occupancies are inspected annually. A report will be generated to the District Board of Directors quarterly.

In closing I wish to thank the Grand Jury for bringing this matter to our attention. I can assure you that the staff of the Penn Valley Fire District, the Board of Directors, and I are very concerned about public safety. We welcome any future inquiries you may have about our District operations.

Response

Dear Mr. Janison,

The Grand Jury report indicated two recommendations for the findings concerning this subject. I will address them as follows:

1. The Grand Jury encourages those Departments not currently conducting annual inspections of the places of public assembly within their districts to begin such a program.

The Truckee Fire Protection District agrees with this philosophy. We also find value in inspecting all places of business within the Fire District. As mentioned in our response, this district services the Town of Truckee, Nevada County and Placer County. We have over 550 commercial businesses, and multiple R-1 structures which we consider a potential threat to public safety as well. Our commercial inspection program encompasses all these facilities during an ongoing inspection process. Isolating one particular type of business or occupancy is a rather myopic view concerning risk management.

Being an independent special district, the Truckee Fire Protection District is not part of the administration of either County or the Town of Truckee. Therefore, we should be listed as a Fire District in your report. This report was not sent to our Board of Directors or to this organization. It would appear the assumption is we are a department within another entity. This is not so. The Building Department of each County and the Town are responsible for the initial construction inspections and designations of places of assembly and the occupancy rating. We have a close working relationship with each department concerning all aspects of construction concerning areas of public risk and implementing appropriate safety measures. We have an excellent record of safety and implementation of safety measures in all aspects of this issue.

2. Everyone in authority within a Fire Department in Nevada County should reference the National Fire Protection Handbook as published by the National Fire Protection

Association, (Section 10-C) "Places of public assembly have long been recognized as a special concern for the fire department because of the life hazard involved".

The Truckee Fire Protection District utilizes the NFPA publications on a daily basis as intended, a guideline. We are familiar with the multiple recommendations listed by the NFPA concerning life threat in all types of assemblies. One of these potential threats and the area resulting in the highest life loss for civilians and fire fighters in the United States is single family dwellings. In the case of this fire district, we have implemented a free home smoke detector program. To this date we have given over 1000 free smoke detectors out for single family dwellings. We have had multiple structural fire responses initiated by an early alarm resulting in zero life lost since inception of this program.

We have also strengthened the process outlined in the Uniform Fire Code concerning fire sprinklers in R-1 assemblies as well as areas of assembly. In the last two years we have had five structure fires in these types of assemblies that were extinguished by sprinklers resulting in minimal property loss and no injuries to civilians or fire fighters.

In closing, I am somewhat dismayed by this report. The totality of the information gathered for this report is a one page letter. There was never any follow up to determine what the Fire District is doing concerning the risk to the public. The result was conclusions derived from my response, not a total fire suppression and prevention system. Although I agree with the philosophy of the Grand Jury, it is singular in approach and the method used to gather the information is not consistent with the good standing of the organization. Ultimately poor investigations result in a poor report which spreads misinformation to the public. This in itself is much more capable of a negative affect on tourism in an area for years to come than an actual or perceived fire event.

The following is the response of the Board of Directors of the Higgins Area Fire Protection District to the 1999-2000 Grand Jury report on Fire and Life Safety Inspection of Places of Public Assembly.

FINDINGS

- 1. While the Higgins Area Fire Protection District's Board of Directors cannot comment on the inspection programs of other departments, it is our ongoing practice to annually inspect all commercial structures within our District's boundaries as part of a formal company inspection program. In addition, we conduct inspections based on building permit checks and complaints.
- 2. Higgins Fire District maintains a high quality, professional inspection program and the Board of Directors cannot comment on the practices of other departments and districts.
- 3. The Higgins Fire District Board of Directors agrees with the letter grade of "A" given to the District, as this is congruent with the quality of our inspection program.
- 4. The Board of Directors agrees that these are some, but not all, of the violations found during inspections of places of public assembly.
- 5. In this District's professional inspection program, these types of life safety violations are required to be corrected immediately at the time of inspection. If the violation(s) cannot be corrected during the inspection, the place of public assembly is immediately closed to usage until the violation is corrected.

All inspections and violations within the Higgins Area Fire Protection District are documented. Violations not cleared at inspection are expediently addressed in a reinspection program.


